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An initiative by the Economic and Social Research Council, with scientific leadership by the Institute for Social and Economic Research, University of Essex, and survey delivery by the National Centre for Social Research.

What is Understanding Society?

- Ambitious study designed to analyse social change and improve lives by examining:
 - what people are experiencing (circumstances and events) peoples attitudes and cognition (views and capabilities) how society really works (behaviours and transitions)
- One of the most important ventures of the century a "living laboratory of changing life in the UK" and the largest longitudinal panel survey in the world
- Funded by the ESRC, Government Departments and Devolved Administrations; delivered by Institute of Social and Economic Research (ISER, University of Essex)
- Began in January 2009; successor to the British Household Panel Study
